According to Ann Oakley, who introduced the term to sociology, "Sex" refers to the biological division into male and female; "gender" to the parallel and socially unequal division into femininity and masculinity' (see Sex, Gender and Society, 1972).

Gender is defined as the social distinctions between masculinity and femininity. People often use the terms gender and sex interchangeably. The former is defined above, whereas the latter is defined as a determination of male or female on the basis of a set of socially agreed-upon biological criteria.

Gender and Sociology. From birth, children are assigned a gender and are socialized to conform to certain gender roles based on their biological sex. Gender roles are based on norms, or standards, created by society. The socialization process in which children learn these gender roles begins at birth.

### Definition of Gender Role in Sociology.

Gender is a term that refers to social or cultural distinctions associated with being male or female. Gender identity is the extent to which one identifies as being either masculine or feminine (Diamond 2002). A person's sex, as determined by his or her biology, does not always correspond with his or her gender.

Sociology of gender is a prominent subfield of sociology. Since 1950 an increasing part of the academic literature, and of the public discourse uses gender for the perceived or projected (self-identified) masculinity or femininity of a person. The term was introduced by Money (1955):
